BRAMBLES PRIMARY ACADEMY

EYFS

Nursery and Reception children have been enjoying a range of topics and activities including fantastic sentence writing, investigating floating and sinking objects, fruit kebab and ice-cream making, jigsaws, learning about the artist Seurat and making mud









Year 1

This term we have been reading a favourite story of ours, The Gruffalo. As the mouse's favourite food is Gruffalo crumble, we decided to write instructions to teach people how to make it. We made some crumble first and it was delicious! We have thought of lots of new adjectives, verbs and adverbs to make our writing more exciting!



Year 2

On Monday 7th June, Year 2 started their new writing text – The Queen's Knickers. To support this, they designed an addition to the Royal knickers' trunk. We thought about what hobbies and interests Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Charles enjoy doing and we incorporated this into our design. We displayed our pants on washing lines to support our writing! It was great fun!









Year 3

During the summer term, Nicky from 'Boro Explorers' came in to teach Year 3 outdoor skills and to develop teamwork skills too. The children learned how to communicate as a team and get a ball to a target using drain pipes. Making string men and dressing them with natural materials encouraged the children to use fine motor skills and to story tell. As a school, we encourage the children to read as often as possible so they made a book marker using flowers and leaves to use when they are reading at home. The children loved these activities and would like to encourage more classes to work outdoors.

Year 4

Science Investigation

As part of our science topic 'Living Things including Humans', the children created an investigation to test the effects of different drinks on human teeth. As we were unable to use real human teeth, we used eggs as the shell of an egg is similar to the enamel of a human tooth. This picture shows the results of this investigation.

Sewing pencil cases

In Year 4, we produced our own textile pencil case as part of our Design & Technology project. We researched existing products and developed a design criteria to ensure that our pencil case would be fit for purpose. The children used felt for the body of their pencil case and they used a running stitch to sew the sides together. Finally, the children used felt shapes, sequins and beads for the decorations to make their pencil cases personal to them. We analysed our finished products in relation to the design criteria. The children are extremely proud of the pencil cases they produced using their own sewing skills and ideas. We now use them in class every day to keep our stationary and belongings safe. We are ready for learning!







Year 5

Buddhism

Y5 children have been studying Buddhism in R.E. They began by exploring what it means to be a Buddhist and explored the teachings of Gautama Buddha. They produced some beautiful handwriting about the origins of Buddhism and the importance of Buddhist temples. The children produced some fantastic powerpoints about the Dharma Wheel, which has eight spokes - representing the Eightfold Path - and is the oldest, universal symbol for Buddhism.

Wind power


Y5 children have been looking at how society can help reduce pollution and climate change through the use of renewable energy. In pairs, they used their knowledge to design and construct a vehicle to move using wind power. The children selected the type of material as well as the size of their sail for the vehicle they had constructed. After construction, each pair tested their vehicles on different surface areas (carpet, desktop and concrete) to see which type would allow their vehicle to move the furthest and be the best to use as a test site for all vehicles. Using their knowledge of friction, the children selected a wooden surface (desktop) as this allowed the 2 surfaces to slide across each other more effectively. Each vehicle was tested from the same starting point with the same amount of wind power (an electric fan) to ensure a fair test.



Year 6

Be Internet Legends

In Year 6, as part of our 'Be Internet Legends' e-safety work, we were tasked with building a robot. First, we had to scan a QR code which was linked to a website with a set of instructions to help us. Each new instruction was unlocked as we answered a question about staying safe online. It was really interesting to see how all the pieces fit together and we were really satisfied with the end result.

Reading

Pupils are continuing to enjoy our lending library and are so excited to choose a library book, to take it home and enjoy for a week, before returning to the library and choosing a new book. Pupils from years 4 and 5 have responsibilities as librarians and keep the library tidy and organised ready for everyone to enjoy. In addition, some pupils are taking home a reading book. This book has been read in school with their teacher first and pupils are then able to confidently share the book at home with their families. This has been very well received by families and will be extended to all classes over the next term.

In our main outdoor area, we have installed a reading and writing shed which pupils can use independently at lunch and play times, as well as during structured sessions as part of their daily timetable. It is lovely to see pupils enjoying new books and reading for pleasure throughout the day, and developing their mark making and early writing skills.



Science

In Science lessons, Year 3 have been learning about the structure of plants. We were lucky to have some plants donated by Arcadia Garden Centre. The children thoroughly enjoyed exploring and investigating the different features of a plant. They also planted some peas and are measuring their growth each week. We can't wait to eat some!







PE

Our oldest children in the academy have been learning to kick a ball for a purpose. They have developed skills to control, stop and kick a ball. Here they are enjoying a game of football rounders.

World Environment Day

Pupils celebrated World Environment Day by exploring different ecosystems. Some children have created their own small world ecosystems including a farm, a beach and a forest. They spent lots of time appreciating our own ecosystem in our school grounds. They looked at the beautiful leaves, trees and plants we are lucky to have and thought about all of the wonderful things on Earth that we are thankful for.

Pupils also upcycled plastic bottles to recreate a learning resource by making Ten Green Bottles. They then used these to sing and learn about number order 1-10 and 10-1.













Healthy Eating Week

Healthy Eating Week is an annual event created by the British Nutrition Foundation (BNF).

It is a week to celebrate healthy living and to encourage people to make positive changes to their lifestyle. At Discovery, we have been exploring being healthy by learning about and tasting different fruit and vegetables, knowing it is important to drink water, moving more and thinking about looking after our minds. We also talked to the children about how everyone is different and how being healthy is different for different people.

History in Year 1

Year 1 held an Edwardian day in school. Children were immersed in a day without technology! They practised the 3R's (Reading, wRiting and aRithmetic) in a traditional way including using chalk on their boards to write with and chanting their times tables. In the afternoon, they learnt to play traditional games such as marbles and dominoes. The children and staff dressed in Edwardian inspired clothing and followed the rules and routines of an Edwardian school.

This day supported the teaching of their History curriculum, during which they learnt about what life was like in Middlesbrough around the time of the construction of the Transporter Bridge.





Pop Art

This term, B3A were introduced to one of the most iconic artists of all time -Andy Warhol and the Pop Art movement. The children explored what constitutes art and why people's opinions on what art is differ, before delving into the Pop Art movement. They investigated a variety of works by Warhol They learnt about the life, work and early techniques of Warhol. The children developed the blotted line technique and then produced their own works of art. They studied some of Warhol's portraits and then created their own Warhol-inspired portraits of staff in school.



To celebrate all the learning, they ended the topic with their very own 'Bug Ball'. Parents went to great efforts to make costumes and a wonderful day was had eating the food the children had made and playing lots of fun games all about bugs! The wiggly worm jelly was a real hit once everyone realised the worms were not the ones they had found in the garden! The children truly had the most magical time!

Through resilience, patience and perseverance, the children drafted, edited and



STEM Club

This term, a selection of children in Year 5 started a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) club. As part of this they are working with professionals from Liverpool John Moores University and the National School's Observatory, and the children have been undertaking tasks to achieve their bronze award. This includes exploring the moon, building the solar system, creating a new planet and launching their own rocket. The children have thoroughly enjoyed it and worked together very collaboratively.

Amazing Andy Warhol Art!

This term, our UKS2 SEND children have really enjoyed being immersed in the Pop Art culture of Andy Warhol; an artist famous for his large, bright prints and iconic images.

To achieve this, the children experimented with a range of art equipment and techniques to create their own vivid prints and paintings. These included print making with acrylics and self-portraiture using a mixed media approach of watercolour or pastels and pen on printed photographs. They also explored digital image enhancing using iPads.

To consolidate the children's learning, we created a film, documenting Warhol's life and work through acting, dancing and narration. This was a lot of fun and a fantastic way to embed all the facts children needed to know. We have certainly found our creative side this term.







Oh I do like to be beside the seaside!

In Year One, we have been imagining what it would be like to spend time on a beach with our friends. As part our beach experience day, we sunbathed in the glorious (albeit imaginary) sunshine, had a whale of time splashing in the water, made fantastic sandcastles and cooled down with refreshing, delicious ice lollies (that we made ourselves!). We discussed our senses and what we would hear, see, smell and taste at the seaside. During our English lessons, we wrote instructions for 'how to make an ice lolly' which we then followed; using juice, cups and lolly sticks and freezing them overnight to make our tasty treats. What a day we had!

They have practised their speaking and listening skills, using appropriate phrases, vocabulary and excellent manners, as well as counting in two pence pieces to pay for their food!

Through 'Get Set Education' and as part of the Travel to Tokyo initiative Pennyman Primary Academy were the proud winners of a Virtual Athlete Visit which will take place later this term. Travel to Tokyo athlete ambassador, British middleweight bronze Olympic medallist, Anthony Ogogo, will be joining our children on a live video call. Anthony, now a professional wrestler, who has also appeared on TV's Strictly Come Dancing and Splash will be sharing stories about his life, sports and career as well as answering some questions from the children.

Changes in Britain since the 1980's

William Morris Art Work

As part of their Art topic, the children in Mrs Gainford's class have been learning about the work of William Morris. Firstly, the children researched the artist and found out that William Morris produced designs for furniture, fabrics, stained glass, wallpaper, and other decorative arts. He was famous for repeated patterns within his designs.

The children were lucky enough to work with local artist Sara Calgie to produce some really effective prints. They then used the skills and techniques learnt to build up their final pieces in the style of William Morris.

They then used different techniques to create their structures and they were so proud of their final creations. 
Mini beasts

PD Ports joins forces with Tees Valley Education Multi-Academy Trust

PD Ports has joined forces with Tees Valley Education Multi-Academy Trust, to create an Enterprise Charter for children and young people across Teesside. Including other key partners and stakeholders, such as Teesside University, this shared commitment to do more for the young people of Teesside, will develop career-led learning opportunities for primary years to post 18.

After recently launching plans to recruit 50 new apprentices across its operations, PD Ports is now accelerating their commitment to raise aspirations, and inspire young people.

Kirsten Donkin, head of PR, marketing and communications at PD Ports, explained how the partnership has been in the port's operator plan since 2019, the launch of PD Ports' innovative Teesport Explorers programme.

"At PD Ports we already do a tremendous amount of work to raise aspirations of young people,"

Kirsten mentioned that the people at PD Ports recognise that by the age of 14, young people have already conditioned themselves into believing what jobs they can and cannot do.

"That was our initial thought process behind launching the Teesport Explorers programme – getting young people down to the port to see our operations and meet our people. It's all about providing consistent engagement throughout childhood and into early adulthood in order to ignite their imagination and show them if they believe it, they can achieve it when choosing a career."

Following this, CEO of Tees Valley Education, Katrina Morley, explained how she believes the partnership with PD Ports will deliver real value to primary school pupils across the region.

"By working in collaboration with the biggest employer in the region, and Teesside University, we are able to construct a variety of curriculum, skills, experiential and project-based learning for all of our children and young people," said Katrina.

"The ability to learn about real world employment opportunities, visit a range of sites, experience being at the forefront of the exciting investment in the area, will have long lasting impact on the life chances, aspirations and choices for all.

"The shared commitment we have to investing in our communities is being realised through the project which will support Year 1 children to adults. Children hold the keys to the future... but we must help them to unlock a range of possibilities with them."

After winning the NEPIC Communities and Reputation Award, PD Ports donated their winnings of £2000 for the Tees Valley Education Trust to kick-start the Enterprise Charter.

PD Ports was commended at the prestigious awards for its outstanding demonstration of community support and social responsibility throughout 2020.

Tees Valley Education have just received a further donation from PD ports of £1500 which is amazing!
