

Headstart Award

HeadStart aims to give all 'Middlesbrough's children and young people the necessary support to build resilience to achieve good emotional health'.

In 2015 the Government's Future in Mind report was published, providing national recognition of the need to make dramatic improvements in children's mental health services, the HeadStart programme has been developed in response to the needs highlighted in the report.

HeadStart aims to introduce support within school, home, the community and on-line taking on a preventative and early intervention approach to equip young people aged 10-16 years to cope better with difficult circumstances.

There are currently 423 HeadStarters in Middlesbrough accessing mental health training to build resilience and help them to support their peers!

At Brambles Academy, the Welfare team set about gaining HeadStart status in September 2019. We originally aimed to be awarded the Bronze status which would acknowledge our commitment towards this important focus. However, Miss Beadling, supported by Mrs Duffill aimed higher and we have actually

achieved silver status and have been awarded a £6,000 grant. A huge well done needs to go to the team for their enthusiasm, dedication, and commitment in achieving this status; their hard work to providing the very best for our children and families is very much appreciated by all.

Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day



Digital Learners

At Pennyman we are incredibly fortunate and now have five sets of iPads across the academy for children to use. In addition, we have received iPads and laptops from the Department for Education which we can loan to children who do not have access to technology at home. This is to enable them to access learning if they have to self-isolate.

We have invested in lots of new apps and websites which support children's learning during lessons too, as these will be used in the academy and as part of interventions at home.

Our children love practising their spellings using Spelling Shed; improving their arithmetic skills with SumDog; challenging each other to battles on Times Tables Rockstars; and reading and listening to audiobooks using the Sora library app. They also enjoy making computer programs using Scratch and joining in with Mr Nixon's virtual music lessons using Garage Band!

Pupils are also gaining lots of confidence using Seesaw - this allows children to communicate with their teachers, complete work and receive feedback if they are unable to come into school due to illness or selfisolation.

Library and Author Visits

This term we have been lucky enough to have been 'virtually' joined by some incredible authors, who have shared their writing experiences with the children.

Key Stage 2 children completed an interactive drawing session with Chris Riddell OBE, who illustrated his talk live, as well as answering questions about his work.

They also spoke to academy favourite Harriett Muncaster, whose Isadora Moon and Victoria Stitch books have been flying off the shelves in the library.

In Key Stage 1, the children read along with picture book author John Kane and his fantastic, funny books I Say Boo You Say Who, and I Say Ooh You Say Ahh. The children were in hysterics trying to keep up with each action.

Most recently, school had a double author visit! KS1 had the chance to talk live with Chitra Soundar, whilst she was in her studio in India, and KS2 posed questions for the wonderful David Almond, who had joined us to discuss his new book Brand New Boy. These experiences have helped inspire children across the academy towards writing creatively, and introduce them to some fantastic new books!

Pennyman Curriculum Champions

To celebrate our commitment to a broad and balanced curriculum and to give every child every chance to shine, this term, we have introduced our 'Curriculum Champion' awards. As an academy, we recognise the importance of not only English and Maths, but of each curriculum subject in its own right. The idea behind the awards is to champion those children who have a passion for PE, a desire to design or a have a skill set for science. Each term, every class nominates someone from each category. The categories include English, maths, science, PE, history,

computing, geography, art, music, PHSE, RE and design technology.

It was wonderful to find out why children had received their awards. The reasons ranged from children demonstrating a real passion for a specific subject to being incredibly knowledgeable to learning and crafting new skills. We held a virtual awards ceremony across the academy where the children were presented with their certificates and badges. It is wonderful to see the children around the academy proudly wearing their badges.







Black History Month

Black History Month UK is a celebration of black history that takes place between 1st - 31st October every year. This year, the 33rd UK Black History Month was celebrated in Pennyman. Children were taught about the history of influential black people. 




Junior Leadership Team


Wilton Expects We...

Activities at Wilton

The Nursery and Reception children have been reading the Gruffalo and learning about woodland animals and their homes. Retelling the story with puppets and masks has been lots of fun. They were very excited to receive a letter from the mouse asking for help to find the Gruffalo. The children went on a hunt outside and found the Gruffalo's den. They wrote letters back to the mouse and drew maps to the den. If you see the Gruffalo please let us know!

Y1/2 enjoyed learning about the artist Angie Lewin. They used mark making, sketching and printing techniques. The children have loved the ability to work in our Art room with lots of resources at hand to explore with.

As part of the Science topic, How do we move and grow? the children in Year 3 & 4 have been investigating what is inside their hands and how do they move. The children worked in pairs to build a bionic hand made out of cardboard, strings, straws and rubber bands. They related the bionic hand to their own hand in order to understand the function of the fingers and the importance of the thumb, to grab or hold objects with different shapes and forms. Pupils learned that it would not be possible to move the human hand if it was only composed of bones. They understood how the bones, muscles, tendons and ligaments work, by comparing them with the materials used on the bionic hand to move the fingers. The children explored, tested and made improvements to their designs.

Y5/6 completed a study of the artist Andy Goldsworthy who creates his art using the environment. The children used our school environment to investigate different shapes that they could create. They had a great time! In Geography, the children enjoyed developing their knowledge of the location of major oceans and seas in the world and can now explain the difference between oceans and seas. The class are looking forward to deepening their learning throughout the new topic, Rivers.

As part of our drive to understand diversity and global citizenship, the academy took part in the Say No to Racism day by wearing red clothing. The classes discussed what Racism means and thought about how to treat people fairly. The children also took part in Children in Need embracing the Five to Thrive focus for the week. Mental health and wellbeing is so important to us and we have been discussing this throughout the term and the children enjoyed watching the Joe Wicks videos linked to the five areas needed for us to thrive.















TEES VALLEY EDUCATION - PAUL HAMLYN

This term is the final term that the schools will be working with artists, supported by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation's Teacher Development Fund.

This term the project has adapted to the changes in school and to keep the connection with classes and staff, has started to deliver the classes digitally. The artists are continuing to support teachers, who have become confident creators over the course of the project.





We're creative - it's what we do!! Creativity is all about being inquisitive, persistent, collaborative, disciplined and imaginative!! We have to be a role model for the children, showing them that using these habits, we carry on, adapting to new challenges.

This project has embedded creative habits in the children approaches to learning, which they now use across the curriculum. Now, using this new 'Creative Star,' co- constructed with the children themselves, the children can learn to recognise the creative habits when they use them, in all of their lessons across the curriculum. Now we can really start to see how we have embedded creativity!

Health and Wellbeing

The importance of our children's health and wellbeing has never been more important. We're really familiar with our physical health playing a big role but getting classes back on track will provide that all important expression, engagement and agency that the children are used to enjoying in class. Art naturally fits with the 5 ways of wellbeing, which are - Connect, Be Active, Take Notice, Learn and Give. Connection to others helps children feel close to and valued by other people. Activities done together are powerful for all relationships, creating art together is perfect.
