Staying safe when playing out alone

With the arrival of the lighter nights, and hopefully better weather and the forthcoming half term holidays, more children will be playing out without an adult. To help you have conversations together about staying safe, here are some questions you might want to share:

If you decide that your child is ready to take on this responsibility, there is some questions you should ask before they go out:

- · Where do they want to go?
- What do they want to do?
- Who will they be with?
- How far away from home will they go?
- How long do they want to stay out for?

There are also some things you should ensure your child knows before they go out:

- Their full name
- Their address
- Two trusted adults phone numbers
- How to cross roads safely

Talk to your children about the risks of being alone, not to scare them but to prepare them and help keep them safe. Have conversations like:

- A stranger tries to talk to them, or take them somewhere?
- · Someone they know tries to take them somewhere, without asking you?
- Someone bullies them?
- Someone asks them to do something they are uncomfortable with?
- They or one of their friends get hurt?

Before they go out, set some rules, and if they don't follow the rules revaluate whether or not they can be trusted to go out alone yet? Some rules to consider are:

- How far can they go from home?
- How long can they stay out?
- Who can they go out with or meet?
- When is their agreed home time?
- What activities are ok for them to do?

Supporting Year 6 with their transition to secondary school

Starting secondary school can be scary for some children. New experiences, new people and the unknown is daunting for even adults. Start talking to your year 6 child now so by September they feel confident and ready for this new phase of their life. BBC Bitesize has pulled together some resources to help them through the transition, with topics like making new friends, a day in the life of a Year 7, myths about secondary school, emotional support advice from Dr Radha and even advice from celebrities.

Some small ways to make the first few days as stress free as possible:

- Practice the route to their new school together. For many children it might be their first time walking to school alone or
 getting a bus. Practicing a few times with an adult can boost their confidence and lower stress and unfamiliarity on the big
 day.
- Go shopping together for new school supplies. Picking out stationary, bags and anything else they may need can get them excited to start their new school!
- Pack their bag together for the first day so they know that they have everything they need. Forgetting something is usually
 a minor inconvenience but in a new situation could cause anxiety and upset.
- If their uniform has a tie teach them how to tie it! Small things like this can help a child feel independent and mature which will give them the confidence to be around older children.

Recipes

Fajitas



Follow these 8 easy steps for some delicious chicken fajitas!

Ingredients

- 4 chicken breasts, cut into chunks
- olive oil, for frying
- For the marinade
- 4 limes, juice only
- 2 tsp fajita seasoning
- 4 spring onions, finely sliced
- 1 fat garlic clove, crushed
- For the salsa
- 1 red pepper
- ½ jar roasted pepper (we used Gaea Red Peppers Flame Roasted 290g)
- 1 small apple, peeled
- 4 ripe tomatoes
- ½ lime, juice only
- small bunch coriander, leaves picked
- chilli sauce, to taste (optional)
- For the guacamole
- 2 very ripe avocados, halved and stone removed
- ½ lime, juice only
- grated cheese, to serve
- To serve
- 6 8 tortillas (you can now get mini tortillas for kids)
- soured cream (optional)

Method

STFP 1

Grown-ups: Put the chicken and marinade ingredients in a bowl and cover. Put in the fridge for at least two hours.

STEP 2

Children: If your children are 5 or over, you can get them to roughly chop the pepper, roasted pepper, apple and tomatoes for the salsa using a good quality firm plastic knife or cutlery knife. Otherwise do this yourself. Younger children can pick the leaves from the coriander and mix them into the salsa.

STFP 3

Grown-ups: Tip the salsa ingredients into a food processor, along with the lime juice and a little seasoning and pulse until finely chopped. Take out 2 large spoons of the mixture for younger children, then add chilli sauce, if using, and pulse again to combine.

STEP 4

Children: Squeeze or spoon the avocado into a bowl and use a potato masher to mash it. Stir in the lime juice and some black pepper with a spoon. Lime juice can sting so grown-ups may want to squeeze them for younger children.

STFP 5

Grown-ups: Heat a little olive oil in a frying pan and pour the contents of the chicken bowl into the pan. Cook for 5-8 minutes or until the chicken chunks are cooked through.

STEP 6

Children: Put the grated cheese, salsa (for grown-ups and children), guacamole and sour cream in separate colourful bowls to put on the table.

STEP 7

Grown-ups: Heat the tortillas according to the pack instructions and put the cooked chicken in a bowl. Show children how to fill and roll their tortilla.

STEP 8

Children: Lay out your tortilla, choose your toppings, roll them up and eat!
