Saint Saens: Carnival of the Animals ~ Fossiles




Resources


You will need some sensory resources available for this story.

- Bowl of salt water
- Smooth snail shell
- Woolen spiral grooved track
- Sand tray
- Ticking clock sound switch
- Pieces of shale
- Pebbles in a jug
- Tray of stones
- Torch or switch operated light
- Ammonites
- Pieces of dark fabric



Salt water to splash
Taste salt water
Swimming actions (gross
motor)





Feeling a smooth snail shell Trace fingers along wooden spiral track (fine motor) Spin around (gross motor)






Sand tray – children run fingers through sand, pour sand onto children's hands

Sound switch – ticking clock Feel pieces of shale







Over many, many, many years Oh, what a dreadful shock! Held in place within the shale Our ammonite turned to rock

Pour a jug of pebbles into a tray of stones — listen to the sound


Torch or switch operated light
