Mr Blue Sky – Makaton version






Resources


You will need some sensory resources available for this story.

- Shallow water tray
- Blue food colouring
- Jug & bowl
- Water spray
- Artificial grass
- Artificial flowers
- Rain sounds (sound switch or screen)
- Heavy rain sounds
- Toy cars
- Toy house / dolls' house
- Sad music on sound switch or screen (e.g. 'Demons' by Imagine Dragons
- Sand tray

- Sound switch "Pula!"


