For learners with a reduced attention span, it may be appropriate to read about just one or two of the insects at a time.


Insect toys

Noodles Sound switch - "think I'll go eat worms" Veg Edible soil





These eight legged beasts Scurry silent and fast They climb up walls in the dark Watch the world bumbling past



Until it's good and dead




Flies (toys) Sound switch – buzzing sound





The buzzing hum of dirty flies When weather's getting warm As soon as you see one of them You know there'll be a swarm




Play food

Sound switch - snoring Butterfly toy / art




Then spins a bed and goes to sleep
