



He went up and asked for "more please".




Sound switch - "MORE?"




"More?" shouted Mr Bumble, "More?"

Nancy was kind to Oliver.




Sound switch – "Run away" The Corrs

Oliver is rich.




Flowers Lavender (fresh or dried) Sound switch - birdsong
