


### Resources

You will need some sensory resources available for this story.

- Smooth pebbles and cobbles
- Rough / jagged stone
- Strips of red & orange fabric or tissue paper
- Metal baking tray and spoon
- Hot/warm water
- Grey or black paint powder
- Salt water
- Hand-held fan
- Bowl of water
- Fabric bag



# Experiences Strips of red & orange fabric or tissue paper Metal baking tray and spoon to crash



Fire and smoke noise and crash red hot lava explodes from a volcano



powder




### A jagged stone tumbles down the slope soon trapped in lava and ash



Experiences
Students crouch down and curl up (gross motor)
Salt water to taste




The stone lies for millions of years buried deep in the slope of the mountain Close to the sea

Splash!






### For many, many years the stone tumbles in the waves



## Resources and Sensory Experiences Two pebbles or cobbles to knock together




### As it tumbles it is knocked smooth by sand and other stones








Now a smooth pebble, it washes up onto the beach
