The little old man and a little old lady had no money and no food. "We will have to eat the rabbit", said the lady and she put a big pan of water on the fire.




Leopard-print fabric for students to feel/drape around shoulders

The jaguar pulled and pulled to bend the tree down.




Students bend down and spring back up again




Just as the jaguar was about to snatch the rabbit...


...the tree sprang upright again.
