Blow on learners' hands or cheeks Encourage learners to blow



Fan Fluffy sheep Artificial grass




The seed spun through the air..

# The sapling grew into a small tree.


Sometimes the farmer stopped to eat his lunch by the tree.



Lycra band in a loop – learners pull the band to its maximum extension Learners (and adults) flex muscles




The small tree grew for 150 years. It became a big, strong tree.

Heart-shaped cushion Fabric with hearts on Learners shade their eyes to 'search' in the distance




Some came from a long way away just to see the tree.

Toy / home made model axe Sound switch – chain saw sounds




One night two men decided to cut the tree down.
